



Homework

Homework for English is set weekly and consists of short, chunked questions about the literature texts.

This is set on Seneca, which marks homework and provides areas of development for pupils based on the knowledge they have displayed.



Seneca provides opportunities for active learning and spaced retrieval which are key as revision tools.



How teachers have been preparing students

Fortnightly 'big write' – a practice exam question under exam conditions. Teachers mark and give feedback to aid progress.

This data is also used to track progress regularly and identify pupil needs for 'Success Sessions' and Saturday School.

Mathematics

We study Edexcel Mathematics at SPA.

Students will sit 3 exams in May and June.

Mathematics is a tiered exam.



Mathematics

We have carefully considered whether your child should sit Foundation or Higher.

Students sitting Foundation Mathematics can attain grades 1-5.

Students sitting Higher Mathematics can attain grades 3 – 9.

Mathematics

Every Tuesday

- For any student on either tier, the first half of the paper is crucial for obtaining either a Grade 4 or 5 on Foundation or a Grade 6+ on Higher.
- The staples is roughly 40 marks.
- If you gain 40 marks on all 3 papers then you have already scored 120 marks.
- Based on recent grade boundaries:
 - **Grade 4** on Foundation requires approximately 150 marks.
 - *You would need an approximate average of 10 more marks per paper.*
 - **Grade 5** on Foundation requires approximately 180 marks.
 - *You would need an approximate average of 20 more marks per paper.*
 - **Grade 6** on Higher requires approximately 120 marks.
 - *You can achieve this on the first half of the paper alone!*
 - **Grade 7** on Higher requires approximately 150 marks.
 - *You would need an approximate average of 10 more marks per paper.*





Study Skills – Claiming your space

Organise your space: Design one learning space in your home – that will be the same each time you use it. Ensure it has the equipment you need and is clutter free so you can focus.

Eliminate Distractions: Store your phone away from your desk – turned off ideally. Use a watch to time your session. Place a sign on your door asking not to be disturbed.




Study Skills – The Pomodoro Technique

Focussed Work: This technique involves 25 minutes of focused work, followed by a break.

Treat yourself: After the period of work – take yourself away from your learning space. Do something unrelated to learning or school.



The Forgetting Curve – Why it's important to space retrieval



Repetition leads to remembering: Knowledge must be repeated in order to commit to long term memory, and this is done better when repeated over time.




Flashcards

Small cards used as a study aid

One side contains a question, term or concept

The other side has the answer/explanation.

Flashcards help active recall – stimulating your memory during learning – strengthening neural connections.



Creating Great Flashcards



How to Write Effective Flashcards

1. Keep it Simple

Each flashcard should focus on one question or concept. Overloading a card can be overwhelming.

Bad Example: "What are the causes of World War I and how did each contribute?"

Good Example: "What event sparked the beginning of World War I?"




How to Write Effective Flashcards

2. Use Imagery and Mnemonics:

Where possible, include images or mnemonic devices that can help make the information stick.

Example: For biology, include a diagram on one side with labels to identify on the other side.



How to Write Effective Flashcards

3. Be Clear and Concise:

Avoid long sentences. Use bullet points or key phrases instead.

Example:

- **Front:** "List the three branches of the UK government."
- **Back:** "Executive, Legislative, Judicial"


How to Write Effective Flashcards

4. Personalize Your Cards:


Make them meaningful to you. If a certain word or concept reminds you of something, use that association.

Spaced Retrieval – Using your Flashcards

Space out your flashcard review sessions over days, weeks, or months. This method, known as spaced repetition, strengthens your memory over time.



Spaced Retrieval – Using your Flashcards



Using your Flashcards

Test Yourself Regularly:

- **Explanation:** Regular self-testing reinforces what you've learned and identifies gaps in your knowledge.
- **Practical Tip:** Set aside specific times to go through your flashcards and stick to that schedule.

Using your Flashcards

Avoid Passive Reviewing:

- **Explanation:** Simply flipping through flashcards without actively trying to recall the answer isn't effective.
- **Practical Tip:** Cover the answer and try to speak or write it down before checking.

Bad examples...and GOOD examples!

Front: "Explain the structure of DNA, including the double helix, base pairs, and the role of nucleotides."

Back: "DNA has a double helix structure made up of two strands that coil around each other. The base pairs are adenine with thymine, and guanine with cytosine, connected by hydrogen bonds. Nucleotides are the building blocks of DNA, each consisting of a sugar, phosphate group, and a nitrogenous base."

Front

"What are the base pairs in DNA?"

Back

"Adenine pairs with thymine, and guanine pairs with cytosine."

"What is the structure of the DNA molecule?"

Back

"A double helix composed of two strands that coil around each other."

Front

"What are the components of a nucleotide?"

Back

"A sugar, a phosphate group, and a nitrogenous base."


